

Most of the artwork in this booklet has been printed by Birgitta Volz in 2021 from tree roots located on the pathway to the memorial site "Schupf", near Happurg, Germany.

It is a place in nature where the corpses of hundreds of political prisoners were secretly cremated by the SS.

Between 1944 and 1945 more than 4000 slave workers died of inhuman living and working conditions in the Hersbruck concentration camp.

"Research of the Invisible" is my artistic theme since more than 25 years.

I work with block prints, which I take directly from the bark of living trees or other plants, as well as from natural stones and sometimes also from man made structures.


Magic is unfolding, as soon as I do my printing work. My "models" gift me with different archetypes and stories, depending on their cultural environment.

I am convinced that the trees, stones or our environment in general are recording the history of their place and of its "clandestine" inhabitants.

I try to unveil the inner aspect, the very soul of nature, which has been well known and venerated in most ancient cultures.

Once I finish the printing beautiful structures are visible on the bark.

The trees or stones look like pieces of art themselves and they attract the attention of the people, who start seeing them with different eyes.



I try to open the hearts of people through the beauty of nature.

I hope the manifestations in my prints makes humans reflect about a consciousness, that inhabits everything around us.

Hopefully, some will be able to gain access to the spiritual aspects of the nature and treating it with more respect.

About the Technique of Bark Printing:

The process of printing starts with a good cleaning of the tree surface. A thin layer of oil colour is applied to it with a roller. Then paper or fabric is placed and soft pressure is applied to rub the colour into it.

As I work entirely without chemicals and solvents, my technique does not harm the trees. The excess colour stays visible on the bark making the tree look like a beautiful sculpture for some time, as the beauty of its structures is more prominent.

The print needs to dry overnight in a safe space. The process is physically very challenging and works like a meditation in motion. I can only control the composition while I am printing, the result often is a surprise. I try not to manipulate but to unveil what wants to be seen.





The white water solvable ground colour on the Granite bolder makes sure that the next heavy rain will wash off the black oil colour, so that the land art installation will look untouched again.
